

## CONFLICT MINERALS POLICY

In July of 2010, the United State Congress passed legislation (Section 1502 of the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act) requiring public companies to report the use the “Conflict Minerals” necessary to the functionality or production of the products manufactured or contracted to be manufactured, pursuant to which the United State Securities and Exchange Commission adopted the Conflict Minerals Rule (“Rule”) on August 22, 2012. Summit Wireless Technologies, Inc. (“Summit”) as a publicly traded company is subject to this Rule.

Conflict Minerals are Tin, Tantalum, Tungsten and Gold (“3TG”) that are mined in conditions of armed conflict and human rights abuses, mostly in the eastern provinces of the Democratic Republic of the Congo (“DRC”) or adjoining countries Angola, Burundi, Sudan, Tanzania, Rwanda, Uganda and Zambia (collectively with DRC, the “Covered Countries”).

Summit supports the Rule with the goal of ending violence, human rights violations and environmental devastation in the Covered Counties. We are committed to complying with the Rule, and expect our suppliers to share our values around human rights, ethics and environmental responsibility and provide materials that are conflict-free.

Summit has considered the Rule’s requirements, related guidance from the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (“OECD”), the Responsible Minerals Initiative (“RMI”) and others and is implementing its Conflict Minerals program accordingly.

Summit performs a Reasonable Country of Origin Inquire (“RCOI”) with each of our supplies and requires them to complete the RMI Conflict Minerals Reporting Template (“CMRT”). A list of smelters that have been audited for compliance with the RMI conflict-free smelter program is available on the RMI website, which is continuously updated as more smelters are audited.

Based on these results, Summit has concluded that it has no reason to believe that any conflict minerals are used in the manufacturing of our products.

In addition to the effort mentioned above, Summit will take the appropriate actions to fully comply with regulations regarding “conflict minerals” and will support effort by its customers to reach our common goal to build a socially responsible supply chain.
